Recent Acquisitions For The Archives





Early this year, PAHA was contacted by the Mountain View Historical Society (MVHS) about a large donation of materials they received after the death of one of their members, Garrett Hammell.

Garrett had a storage locker, and after the MVHS spent an afternoon going through it, they found a considerable amount of Palo Alto related materials. We were able to collect six large boxes of Palo Alto treasures from the storage locker!

Garrett obviously had an eye for interesting artifacts and sought out compelling pieces of history on eBay and other places. His donation includes numerous menus from Palo Alto restaurants now gone, magazine advertisements from Silicon Valley start-ups and hundreds of postcards and matchbooks from various Palo Alto restaurants, motels, and businesses.

Besides the artifacts being unique, my other favorite part of this donation is the care that was taken to preserve the items. Most of the items were sleeved in polyurethane to protect them from wear and tear. His postcards were carefully collated in binders, and everything was boxed to prevent light damage. We recommend to anyone who has collected similar types of items to take the same kind of preservation care—it will add years to the life of your objects.



We are excited to add Garrett's collection to the Archives and want to remind everyone that if you have similar Palo Alto memorabilia, keep us in mind when you are thinking about donating!

It's been nearly 15 years since the Palo Alto History Museum sponsored an event entitled "60 over 50". The event celebrated over 60 businesses in Palo Alto that had been in business for at least 50 years as of 2006. Of those 2006 celebrated businesses, the following still remain today:
